Many of us are voracious readers, opting to shake off the urge to "veg out" watching television or playing video games, to enjoy the joy found in the pages of a book. The

passion for reading can usually be traced back to childhood. In the second letter Paul wrote to Timothy he reminded him of the following. "You, however, continue in the things you have learned and become convinced of, when you knowing learned them; and that from childhood you have

known the sacred writings which are able to give you the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus." (3:14-15)

Paul noted in the first chapter of 2Timothy, that Timothy's grand-mother and mother were the ones who first introduced the Scriptures to him, "For I am mindful of the sincere faith within you, which first dwelt in your grandmother Lois, and your mother Eunice, and I am sure it is in you as well." (1:5) Now as an adult, it was incumbent on Timothy to nurture that seed and grow with respect to knowledge.

Knowledge cannot remain static, it either grows or withers. As seen in Hebrews, chapter five. "For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you have need again for someone to teach you the elementary principles of the oracles of

God, and you have come to need milk and not solid food." (v.12)

Lewis, which is a German word defined as being a yearning or craving. Some psychologists use the word to represent thoughts and feelings about all facets of life that are unfinished. As long as we live, there must be a desire to press ever forward, realizing that in short, we are a work in progress. "Therefore, leaving the elementary teaching about the Christ, let us press on to maturity..." (Hebrews 6:1)

Solomon noted, "The mind of the intelligent seeks knowledge, but the mouth of fools feeds on folly." (Proverbs 15:14) Deep within each one, needs to be a burning desire for knowledge. The benefits to be derived are incalculable. "How blessed is the man who finds wisdom, and the man who gains understanding." (Proverbs 3:13)
